# Pastor's Report

# **Annual Report 2023**

Dear Family of God at Cross Roads,

As I reflect on the ministry and mission of Jesus Christ at Cross Roads in 2023, I continue to go back to the concept of "journey." It is often hard to consider the church on a journey, as for many of us the church is this building, this space, with its familiar smells, sights, and sounds, with its fixed location on Haymaker Rd, its permanent residency in our lives. But churches, just like humans, are on a constant journey, and my job as a pastor is to help you all write this chapter of our journey together in the annals of this congregation. I am proud and grateful to write that journey together with all of you, the family of God in this corner of the world.

Journeys are not uncommon in scripture. In fact, most stories in scripture are in some way about a journey a person is making: Abram journeying to "the land that God will show him," the Israelites journeying through the desert to the Promised Land, Ruth and Naomi making the journey back to Israel to find solace with their long-distance family, the Magi journeying to meet baby Jesus, Jesus himself journeying throughout the Holy Land (he's always on his way somewhere), eventually journeying into Jerusalem to face the cross. This is not an accident: journey is possibly the best way to describe our relationship with God. There are ups, there are downs, there are days when we rely entirely on God, and there are days when we get completely lost.

The journey of Cross Roads Presbyterian Church in 2023 has been really unique. This year is one that I believe we should be proud of, that we should celebrate with joy, and that perhaps may inspire us for the future. In 2023, we had phenomenal children's programming: a VBS program that made a fabulous impact on the community around us, a Youth Sunday led by great youth who have grown up here or who are new to our community, a Family Fall Festival Sunday attended by over 170 people, our usual crowd for Trunk or Treat, a new Christmas event complete with a pageant, and a wildly successful Family Christmas Eve service. This is no simple feat; it's taken the effort, time, and diligence of many people, and for that I am deeply grateful.

The journey of 2023 has also included some ways that we have learned to respond to the world around us. In March, we responded to the fire that occurred at the Cambridge Square Apartments by working with our community to coordinate financial and material resources for the victims. We also responded to a Hurricane Freddie which devastated the lives of members of our partner church in Malawi. And we have continued to work with other food pantries to meet the needs of our community, as needs increase and resources become scarce. It hasn't been easy, and the road hasn't always been clear, but we are doing the work of Jesus in Monroeville. And that is something to celebrate.

So, as we embark on the next page of the chapter in 2024, I encourage us to continue to reflect on the greatness of 2023, the work that we are building, to discern where God is moving and what God is calling us to do in our community. We are on an incredible journey, and I am looking forward to where God will lead us next!

# **Director of Christian Education's Report**

Have we traveled around the Sun once again? This year, aside from maintaining and growing our programs, I set the goal of building a deeper relationship with the adults in our congregation. With that in mind, we hosted and added some events that allowed for the students and adults to be in fellowship together. We added a Family Festival, a Youth Sunday where the upcoming yearly schedule was presented and explained, and a Christmas Program for which the whole congregation was invited.

My hope was that we could start to bridge the gap that sometimes grows between the older congregation members and the younger attendees. In youth group, we have extended our deep dive into the Old Testament foundational stories, and we are still answering the question of why Jesus, and Jesus' sacrifice, was necessary. The goal is to understand the history of the broken relationship between God and God's people (A relationship WE broke), and then from there, look at the ways in which God continues to offer temporary fixes to that relationship. This understanding will hopefully lead to a better sense of why the perfect sacrifice was necessary, to truly bring us back to a right relationship with God.

This year we also provided many options for trips of many different kinds. We had a camp option for youth from third grade all the way through young adulthood and we took a mission trip to downtown Pittsburgh where we worked with multiple missions throughout the city. The goal for this local trip was about more than learning about the importance of service. It was also to introduce our students to some of the local options for serving others. The hope is that we would all take the initiative to help others whether it is part of a planned trip with our group or not. We also went on one retreat to Ligonier where we partnered with other youth groups from around the Pittsburgh area.

We have continued to be involved with the Trinity Youth Conference, which is a camp for high school and college-aged young people. We hope to bring a few more students this year as more have reached the age for attendance. We have continued to offer options for our elementary and preschool aged students on Sunday morning at Kingdom Kids as well as continuing a nursery option for the young families in the congregation. Both groups have involved the assistance of volunteers from the congregation, and I have received great feedback about how much they have all enjoyed working together in these capacities. I have continued to take a Sunday School approach to Kingdom Kids and have been teaching them the foundational, Old Testament stories, but in a simpler way than with the youth group. It has been a joy to watch these young students begin to connect Biblical dots as we travel from story to story in our journey together.

I have also maintained the partnership with our amazing preschool teachers on a few events throughout the year. We saw great successes with our Easter Egg Hunt and the Trunk or Treat events. Pastor Lindsay and I also join with the preschool classes once a month to do a story time and sing along which has been more fun that I can explain. Each of these opportunities has shown me how blessed we are to have such a great program for young children running out of our own building and also how lucky we are to have the teachers and directors that run that program. I look forward to continuing to partner with them moving forward.

I hope that this has given you all a positive but brief look at what this year has looked like from the perspective of the Director of Christian Education. With that said, there is so much more to share and more work to do! Please come and see me and we can discuss what the future looks like for youth at Cross Roads Presbyterian Church!

# 2023 MUSIC REPORT 1/30/24

BELL CHOIR – Throughout the year of 2023 the bell choir contributed monthly to the services, as well as special services. There were 9 regular members. Julia Schirm added percussion to several pieces this fall and advent season. Kerry Broker additionally contributed her talents to the choir. With the addition of Julia and Kerry we could have the option of ringing 3 octave arrangements currently in our library. We would not be able to add additional ringers since we currently have 3 octaves of bells and limited space.

SANCTUARY CHOIR – Consisting of only 5 members, the Sanctuary Choir has continued to thrive. These 5 women are dedicated and serious about presenting music every Sunday. They should realize it is appropriate for them to take time off, especially since there are only 5 of them. It takes time to find appropriate music they enjoy.

CHIRLDRENS CHOIR – The Children's Choir consists of 4 members, 1st grade-5th. Attendance is inconsistent, but they were able to sing approximately 6 times in 2023, plus special services. The program has changed to meet the needs of the

# **Session 2023 Annual Report**

The session has the responsibility for governing the congregation and guiding our activities in relation with God in the world. Toward this end, session has taken actions to provide a suitable place for the congregation to meet for worship, education, and spiritual growth. Session has planned and lead regular efforts to reach the community in some specific and meaningful ways.

In support of this general mission, session, has taken action to maintain a stable congregation with 2 confirmations, 5 new members, 4 baptisms, 6 dismissals, and 6 deaths. Current active membership stands at 267.

Session approved an Emergency Preparedness Plan, and approved COLA wage increases for the staff as a way of minimizing the effects of inflation. Session initiated an effort to create a Technology Committee which will be responsible for the design and updates of the church website. A new hire was accepted to support the nursery on Sundays. Various study gatherings were accepted, including a Lenten Study in 2023, and more recently a study of the "Words of Jesus" to begin 2024. Several Fundraising efforts were approved. Meeting and uses of church facilities were approved. A proposal from VBS to collect a special offering to "Malawi Kids" was approved. An effort to revise and update the church directory was completed in December.

The session considered participation in the Matthew 25 Movement and entertained a visit by Reverend Ralph Lowe. Reverend Lowe from the Presbytery explained the program and how it is aimed at enhancing some of the community service activities already taking place within our congregation. Lively discussion occurred without a consensus to pursue involvement at this time. However, in keeping with the concepts of the Matthew 25 Movement, the Session did approve some plans to expand on our involvement in the Lazurus Fund.

The old, but reliable riding mower finally failed in 2023 and session approved the purchase of new lawn maintenance equipment.

Finally, Session continues to monitor the financial health and condition of the congregation. While many financial trends are positive, there are some concerns. The various responsible committees involved with governance and planning are working hard and are trusted to take appropriate and conscientious steps to sustain the life of the church.

### **Vacation Bible School – Stellar:**

We had 41 + volunteers to welcome the 60 + children that came and experienced VBS for a week. The children would start with opening learning their Bible point and meet their Bible buddy for the day. Then they would move station to station learning the Bible story, doing a fun craft, playing games and science. During our week they collected food for the Cross Roads Food Pantry and then on Friday they took a monetary donation for

Malawi and collected \$588.77. It was an amazing week of children learning about God's love for the whole world.

VBS 2024 coming this July is Hometown Nazareth – Where Jesus was a Kid!

### **Vacation Bible School Carnival:**

The Carnival on Friday night was well attended by volunteers from VBS, children that attended for the week and their families. We sold cotton candy, and the total raised that evening was \$189.00.

# **Stellar Christmas:**

On a very warm Saturday in December over 40 children and 16 + volunteers came together for a morning of making crafts, playing games, singing Christmas songs, and having lunch before practicing the Stellar Christmas play where we told the story of Christmas. Each child had a part to play. So, after lunch, all the children put on a hat, mask or costume of some sort and headed to the sanctuary where they put on the Stellar Christmas play for their families and relatives. Then we all gather for a time of cookies and fellowship in Fellowship Hall. It was a very enjoyable time for all.

### Adult Education:

There were 263 individuals that attended over 21 Sunday classes in 2023. Faith Works classes averaged between 7-11 people per Sunday. During the Lenten Bible Studies there were between 7-10 folks in attendance.

Our staff continues to work hard and work as a team to provide wonderful worship, a safe and clean building, direct and clear communication, healthy financial overview, education and nurturing of our children and youth, and kind relationships with our congregation. In 2023, our staff had continuous meetings to try to improve our communication with each other and with the congregation. We worked to create a better system for organizing and completing tasks, using technology we have available, for maintaining an accurate calendar, and for making sure doors are locked or unlocked as is appropriate. We will continue to work on these goals in 2024. If anyone has any questions or concerns about the staff or their positions, they should speak with Pastor Lindsay directly as the Head of Staff.

Here are a few things we've accomplished this year:

**Ben Little, DCE:** In July of 2023, we celebrated 2 years of having Ben as our Director of Christian Education. Ben is responsible for Christian Education opportunities for children birth through 12 th grade. The evidence of Ben's deep relationships with our teenagers and magnetic energy with our children is evident: he can't go anywhere in Monroeville without being recognized! In 2024, Ben will be continuing to develop our great programming, including thoughtful ways for elementary aged children to be involved. Ben will also be participating in a coaching cohort which will be a great asset to his professional development. Please pray for our children and youth and prayerfully consider how you might volunteer to help.

**Debbie Broker, DOM:** Debbie serves us at 16 hours per week, and in that 16 hours, she serves as organist, directs the sanctuary choir, bell choir, and children's choir. She prepares the hymns and special music for Sunday mornings and special services as needed. In 2023, we welcomed new members to the sanctuary choir and continued to be creative in bringing in special musicians for special occasions. In 2024, Debbie will continue to work with these choirs, recruit new members and make a joyful noise to the Lord. Please pray for our music program, that all that we do would be pleasing to God.

**Chrissy Newmyer, CFA:** In 2023, Chrissy served as the anchor to our Communications and Financial programming. She did a wonderful job balancing the many parts of her job for us. At the end of January 2024, Chrissy tendered her resignation for the position. While we were very sad to see her go, the Personnel Committee has utilized this as an opportunity to reevaluate our needs in the office. We will be hiring a part time Administrative Assistant (20 hrs. per week) who will be

responsible for the bulletin, calendar/building organization, Newsletter, E-pistle, and other office and administrative tasks. We will also be hiring a very part time Financial Assistant (5 hours per week), who will be responsible for entering contributions, issuing checks, and handling financial reports. Search teams are already at work looking for these positions.

Mark Guyton, C: Mark serves us 25 hours per week during the school year and 16 hours per week in the summertime. Mark is responsible for the general cleaning and maintenance of the church and preschool. Although Mark is usually here Monday through Friday from 3-8 p.m., those hours may vary according to our event schedules. In 2024, Mark will continue to find efficient and cost-effective ways of maintaining the cleanliness of our building. Please pray for our building and for Mark as he makes it possible for us to use it on a daily basis.

**Ellie Kyle, N:** Ellie serves us just 2 hours per week as the primary nursery caregiver during worship on Sunday mornings. She does not work every Sunday, but she does organize volunteers to be there and fill the needed areas of support. Ellie has also provided nursery care during Vacation Bible School and other events. In 2024, Ellie will continue to provide this excellent service for us and our very busy nursery! Please pray four our littlest ones and the many parents who appreciate and love our nursery.

**Nicholas Amity, OA:** Nicholas serves us 6 hours per week as an office assistant. Through a grant through Pittsburgh Presbytery, we were able to hire Nicholas for a year to provide assistance to our office area and continue a process for organizing our information in the front office so that it can be accessible for our officers. Nicholas helped in the creation of our church directory, has organized bulletins and sermons, and has provided support in making copies and cutting postcards when they are needed. Please pray for Nicholas and our office staff as we seek to make a transparent and faithful system that will help us in the future.

# Worship and Music Ministry Team

Worship at Cross Roads has almost returned to pre-Covid practices and attendance. Our average weekly attendance is 85. As the number of Elders has been reduced, returning to Elders passing the trays during communion is no longer feasible to coordinate. But we have a modified method of communion where people come forward to receive the elements and return to their seats to consume them together. In addition, this has reduced our cost and is greener as we are no longer pre-packing the bread and juice.

Thank you to Molly Kyslinger for providing artwork for the bulletins to elevate the special days in the liturgical calendar. The music has been wonderful and the three choirs sound beautiful. A special thanks to the hand bell choir, youth choir and sanctuary choir members for you time and your talent! Thank you, thank you to Debbie for your patience and coaching.

For members who can't make it to church at 10AM, we continue to offer the worship online. Dave Falvo has been recording the worship services and has trained Kolin Ditter to share this responsibility with him. But we are still looking for other to train and add to the schedule. We also have a new usher, Chris Kyle! If you are interested in volunteering for these positions, please see Dave (video recording) or Larry Mayhue (ushering). We are also looking for liturgists, so please sign up on the board in the office hallway.

In September, we had a family-friendly service to which the preschool and VBS families were invited. This was well attended (174 people) and Pastor Lindsay made the service interactive with her large felt board. This was also used during the family-friendly Christmas eve service with smaller felt kits for children and this worship had 100 that attended.

This year Christmas Eve occurred on a Sunday, so it was the fourth Sunday of Advent (until noon) and then the family-friendly and traditional Christmas eve services. Attendance in order was 75, 100 and 130.

Looking forward towards 2024, we will need to replace a few more of the Christmas decorations as they are falling apart as an expense. We will see you in the pews!

# The Deacon Care and Concern List

Throughout the year the Deacons make visits, phone calls, send cards, deliver soup and other care packages to our church family and friends of the congregation. We currently have 27 folks on our care and concern list- this list includes homebound members, sick or recovering from illness or injury, as well as those experiencing hardships. Pastor Lindsay helps to keep us abreast of those in need through our prayer chain which is then passed along to the Prayer Warriors- who meet weekly for a special time of collective prayer. Prayer Warriors have a Deacon representative (Vera McBride). It is a joy to reach out and brighten someone's day with a visit, to provide a smile from a card, or to hold another in prayer.

# Soup Kitchen Ministry

The Deacons hosted one soup making day and a Fellowship hour which invited the congregation to provide soup for fellowship as well as supply our soup ministry. Soup is delivered to our care and concern folks as well as anyone that maybe going through a surgery, illness or could just use a warm cup of soup to brighten their day. It is a joy to deliver homemade soup and other treats to our members in need and have a supply of soup on hand when the need arises.

# The Gift of the Fourth Wiseman

In collaboration with the Cross Roads Food Pantry, the Deacons sponsor the Gift of the Fourth Wiseman. This year we had 34 families participate, 80 children and 160 gifts donated (newborn- 16 years old). It is a joy to brighten the Christmas season for families right here in our community- a mission that the whole congregation looks forward to each year.

# Cross Roads Food Pantry 2023

**Purpose:** The Cross Roads Food Pantry houses a community outreach program uniting people of all faiths to serve Monroeville residents who are in need of food and other necessities, providing them with nutritional food, personal care items, and information on available social services.

**Volunteers:** The food pantry runs exclusively on volunteers – 40 of them - of which 40% are not affiliated with this church but have a desire to serve our community. Weekly, our volunteers order and pick up food from the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, pick up donations from Aldi (10,180 lb. this year), shop at local stores, stock shelves, schedule appointments, pack groceries for distribution, load food into client vehicles, manage client paperwork, and manage the many administrative tasks needed to run the pantry. We are so grateful to have a very dedicated team.

• We are open every Friday (unless Thursday or Friday falls on a Holiday) and our Monroeville clients receive food every 8 weeks (the amount of food they receive reflects the distribution practice we have always done).

**Community:** We continue to reach out to the community to serve those in need, and the community is also a great source of donations and volunteers. Donations come from the scouting community, other faith-based communities, the US Post Office, businesses, and individuals.

- Both the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts are so energetic and happy to participate in food drives
- The preschool continues to do a food drive to help in our Christmas distribution. As each classroom brings down their donations, they are given a tour of the pantry.
- We received 176 lb. of produce from the Cross Roads Garden.
- We finished funding our lighting at the beginning of this past year. However, with client numbers and
  expenses continuing to climb through the year, we had to decrease the number of vouchers we handed
  out and have finally stopped giving out vouchers. We will continue to add them to the Holiday meal
  distributions as there is no protein in those bags.

**Clients:** This past year we served 177 families (8% increase): 170 children, 245 adults and 95 seniors (481 different people and averaging 287 people each month throughout the year). We continue to receive calls from new clients almost every week.

- Our Easter Dinner distribution served 88 families (\\$10\%).
- Christmas Dinner supplies went to 110 families (†20%). Our congregation & the Preschool families supplied us with 40% of the 132 bags we distributed (the largest donation yet). In the12<sup>th</sup> year of the Gift of the 4<sup>th</sup> Wiseman serving our pantry's clients, 34 families (80 children) participated. We continue to get feedback from families of how wonderful their childrens' Christmas was due to all our efforts.
- Our Senior Box program completed its 20th year and currently serves 17 clients.

### Goals:

Net Gain/Loss Balance

- Re-evaluating the structure of the pantry leadership volunteers. There have been volunteers who have moved on or passed without people filling those roles. Moreover, the current leaders are retiring.
- Re-evaluate our shopping/distribution practices with the current state of our economy and the everincreasing number of families reaching out for assistance.

# **Accomplishments for 2023**

- The Board of Directors continues to provide for the care and maintenance of the oldest Cemetery in Monroeville. Groundskeeping, trash removal, and monument maintenance and repair continue to be our largest expenses as we work to preserve this historic location.
- Prices were increased in July 2023 for all services
- In advance of the price increase, discounted prices were offered to Cross Roads members and friends for the purchase of lots. Four lots were purchased at the discounted price.
- We have partnered with Ellis Michaels to replace 10 historic veterans' markers through a grant program.

### Goals for 2024

The Finance Committee is charged with the oversight of all financial actions and records of Cross Roads Presbyterian Church. We take our fiduciary responsibilities to Cross Roads Presbyterian Church very seriously and work to do the best we can. During 2023, the committee acted on many items, some of which are:

Endowments: Accounts with the Presbyterian Foundation have been set up. The Foundation provides quarterly updates on all the endowment funds. All endowment funds that were in various banking institutions, have now been transferred to the Foundation.

Capital Campaign: Payments are being made on the \$39,000 loan financed over 60 months at a rate of 2.5% per annum with payments commencing July 2022. Cross Roads Presbyterian Church started repayments of \$675 to the loan. The loan is scheduled to be paid in full by July 2027. Any and all donations made directly to the Capital Campaign Fund has been used to decrease the amount of the loan. As of December 31, 2023, the balance on the loan is \$8,000 and should be paid in full by the end of 2024!

The Rev. Ellie Johns-Kelly preached on Legacy Giving Sunday – May 7, 2023. She also spoke to the Faith Works Class on legacy giving.

The trustees approved new Toshiba copiers for the church office and the preschool. This has resulted in lower costs for copying for both offices.

Pastor Lindsay applied for a grant of \$5,000 through the Presbytery to hire someone for a few hours a week to update our front space where the office administrator office. The church must raise funds to match. \$5,000 would obligate us to raise \$1,000.

The committee formed a Task Force to research new accounting software. The committee first met on Sunday, September 17. Pastor Lindsay is seeking input from churches about the software they use. The Task Force: Rhonda Moyer-Schultz, Chrissy Newmyer, Rennie Rhodes, Nicole Sloboda Smith, Dominic Zappa, and Pastor Lindsay White.

Last of all, we are always working to reduce the deficit in the General Fund. This year our deficit grew due to circumstances beyond our control – repaving the parking lot, increase in utilities, unexpected repairs to the roof and leaking toilets. (The leaking toilets alone added \$1,000 to our water bill.) As a committee, we have set a goal to keep the deficit under \$50,000! We will introduce a plan at the annual meeting on one way we hope to address this.
