SECOND READING

Mark 10.17-31

¹⁷ As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁸ Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. ¹⁹ You know the

commandments: 'You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honor your father and mother.'" ²⁰ He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." ²¹ Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money^[a] to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." ²² When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

²³ Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" ²⁴ And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is[b] to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵ It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." ²⁶ They were greatly astounded and said to one another, [c] "Then who can be saved?" ²⁷ Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

²⁸ Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." ²⁹ Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, ^[d] ³⁰ who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. ³¹ But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."

No subjects are off the table, but we will have some framework with which to share our thoughts and feelings. Ultimately, these sessions are an opportunity to mend relationships and find ways to join together in love for the bright future God has in store for Cross Roads Presbyterian Church.

The two sessions will be held on Sunday, October 17 from noon-1:30 p.m., and on Tuesday, October 26 from 6:30-8 p.m., both in Fellowship Hall. The prompt for each session will be the same, so we would encourage you to choose one of the two to attend (you're welcome to attend both, but they will be a repeat). In accordance with our current protocols, we will encourage people to wear masks (they are not required, but suggested). Members of Session will be at each of the sessions to participate and to report back at our stated meeting on October 27; the Session has chosen to divide themselves among the two sessions to be efficient with their time. 

In the Bulb There Is a Flower 25C


Hymn of Promise




- 1 In the bulb there is a flow er; in the seed, an ap-ple tree;
